The program will cover 6 years as from 2009, and its total cost is estimated at about UA 60.07 million. It is jointly financed by an ADF grant for an amount of UA 30 million and other donors (GTZ, BGR, European Union, World Bank, and the Islamic Development Bank). The sector objective of the Program is to sustainably reduce poverty among the populations living on the Lake Chad basin resources.
